
#### Families at war

Act one



Paris nodded.


"Come on." Lord

"I haven't even thought about getting married," Juliet said.


"Well, go off to the party and think about it!" Lady Capulet said.

So, with their masks on, the three friends entered the ball.






Inside, the Capulets' guests were enjoying the party of the year. Lord Capulet was pleased to see everyone dancing and having fun.

"No," Romeo said. "Leave me."


So Romeo's friends left. Alone in the garden, Romeo could not stop thinking about Juliet. How would he ever be able to see her again?

Sheltered by the trees, Romeo stood quietly. He had eyes only for Juliet.


"Oh, Romeo!" Juliet said, as she looked out into the night. "How I wish you were not a Montague. But it's just a name...

He ran off, eager to arrange their wedding.


Romeo knew just the man to speak to:

But Romeo kept the news of his wedding to himself. In fact, the only person he told was Juliet's nurse, so that she could pass on the details to his love.


Alone in her room, Juliet was fretting.

Juliet ran as fast as she could to Friar Laurence's chapel.




"Oh, Juliet!" he said, taking her hand. "Can I possibly make you as happy as I am?"

# Tempers and temperatures soar


Act three

Back in the Capulet house that night, Juliet was alone


in her room, waiting patiently for Romeo to return.

"But afterward you must leave," Friar Laurence warned, as Juliet's nurse nodded. "Go to Mantua. Put some distance between yourself and these terrible events."


"I will tell Juliet," her nurse said, and rushed back to the Capulet house.

"Do you think, perhaps, you might let me marry Juliet now?" Paris asked. Lord Capulet looked at his friend. "Wife," Lord Capulet


said, "Go and remind Juliet how much Paris loves her. Tell her they shall be married this week!"

Lord Capulet said. "If you don't marry Paris, I will never speak to you again."


"Help me!" Juliet wailed to her mother.

The Capulets were delighted when Juliet


told them that she would marry Paris. The wedding invitations were sent out immediately.

That night, alone and frightened in her room, Juliet drank the potion that the friar had given her. Within minutes, she fell into a sleep so deep that she seemed dead.


The next morning, when it was time to wake the bride, Juliet's nurse gasped when she found Juliet lying still on her bed.

"It can't be true," Lady Capulet wept.






### Two young lovers meet their fate


Back in Verona, Friar

Moments later, Friar Laurence returned to the vault.


"What's this?" the friar gasped. He found Paris dead outside and Romeo's body lying on the floor inside.
